Since 1956, The Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE) has empowered millions of young people to unlock their potential. Our 70th anniversary in 2026 isn't just a celebration, it's a moment to reflect on what matters most to us as a charity and to recognise our incredible volunteers and dedicated supporters who make our work possible. It's also a time to look ahead.

OUR STORY SO FAR

- 1956** The Duke of Edinburgh's Award for boys is piloted. The programme is made up of Rescue and Public Service Training, The Expedition, Pursuits, and Fitness.
- 1958** The Duke of Edinburgh's Award for girls is piloted. The programme consists of Design for Living, Interests, Adventure, Giving Service, and a Residential Training Course as an additional element at Gold.
- 1961** The Duke of Edinburgh's Award becomes a charitable trust.
- 1969** The Duke of Edinburgh's Award for young people aged 14 to 21 is launched.
- 1975** The number of young people starting their DofE programme worldwide reaches one million.
- 1980** One programme for all young people is launched. The new programme consists of Service, Expedition, Skills, Physical Recreation, and an additional Residential Project at Gold.
- 1986** HRH The Earl of Wessex and Forfar achieves his Gold Award.
- 1988** The International Award Association is established.

- 2001** HRH The Duke of Edinburgh hands over his role as Chairman of Trustees to Sir Tom Farmer but remains as Patron.
- 2006** The Duke of Edinburgh's Award celebrates its 50th anniversary and is awarded a Royal Charter.
- 2009** eDofE, the DofE's online management system is launched.
- 2016** The Duke of Edinburgh's Award celebrates 60 years and launches the DofE Diamond Challenge.
- 2020** The DofE responds to the coronavirus pandemic, with young people dedicating 1.8 million hours of volunteering to their local communities.
- 2021** The DofE family marks the passing of Prince Philip, aged 99. In the same year, the charity launches the Youth Without Limits strategy to reach one million young people by 2026.
- 2023** HM The King confers upon Prince Edward the title "The Duke of Edinburgh". His Royal Highness also becomes Patron of The Duke of Edinburgh's Award.
- 2024** The DofE achieves its 2021 strategic goal of reaching one million young people, two years earlier than planned.

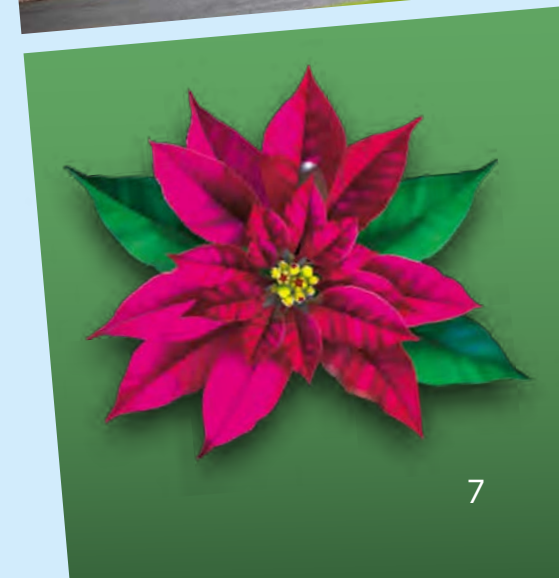

Bringing our history to life:

THE DOFE ARCHIVE

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award has a rich history spanning over seven decades. Our archive collections offer a unique lens through which to tell our story and demonstrate our lifelong commitment to the support and development of young people since our founding days.

HRH Prince Philip, The Duke of Edinburgh, first considered the idea of a national programme to support young people in 1954 at the request of his former headmaster, Kurt Hahn. His Royal Highness believed a youth programme would help young men bridge the gap between leaving school and entering National Service – it would improve their skills and equip them to make a valuable contribution to society, whilst building self-confidence and a sense of purpose.

Under the chairmanship of Prince Philip, a committee was formed to develop a proposal for a "royal badge". The group first met in October 1954 and over the following months outlined the aims and structure of "The Award Scheme". By February 1956, Buckingham Palace was ready to announce a trial of The Duke of Edinburgh's Award, and the scheme formally launched on 1st September 1956. The success of the trial led to the launch of The Scheme for Girls in September 1958, which comprised different sections and requirements. The DofE evolved over subsequent decades and revisions in the 1960s saw the age limits extended and conditions streamlined. In 1980 the sections were fully unified to offer one Award programme for all young people.

The DofE Archive follows the development of the DofE both as a programme and an organisation. Comprising a selection of documents, photographs, publications, objects and media, our holdings bring our history to life and enable us to explore and celebrate our heritage. Our work has unearthed some fascinating content along the way. We've rediscovered forgotten stories and gained a deeper understanding of the journey that has shaped the DofE into the leading youth development programme of today.

We are excited to be sharing our collection highlights for the very first time throughout 2026. We hope the archive will inform, inspire and encourage audiences to reflect on their own DofE experiences as part of our shared history.
